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UNIVEN Celebrates Long Service and Bids Farewell to Retirees at Year-End Function

he University of Venda on Wednesday, 11 December 2024 held its annual Vice- Chancellor and Principal year-end function, celebrating the hard work and dedication of its staff while marking the end of a remarkable year. The event was a fitting occasion to recognise employees who have shown exceptional loyalty and commitment to the university, as well as to bid a fond farewell to 16 retirees who have contributed to the institution's growth and success over the years.

The function, which took place at the University Auditorium brought together staff and senior leadership for a day of recognition, reflection, and gratitude. Key highlights of the event included the presentation of Long Service Awards to 87 staff members who have dedicated between 10 (53 recipients), 20 (13 recipients), 30 (20 recipients) and 40 (two recipients) years of service to the university. Messrs Calvin Mulidzi and Fhatuwani Netshiluvhi received awards for serving the University for 40 years. These employees were honoured for their steadfast commitment to excellence, their role in shaping the university's culture, and their contribution to the success of students and academic programmes.

In addition to the long service recognitions, the university also bid a heartfelt farewell to 16 esteemed retirees of whom 8 were females and 8 males. These individuals, whose careers span many decades, were celebrated for their outstanding work across various departments. The retirees were acknowledged for their leadership, mentorship, and unwavering dedication, leaving behind a legacy that will continue to inspire future generations of scholars, staff, and students at the university.

On Monday, 09 December 2024, in a significant step toward enhancing community development and academic collaboration, the University of Venda (UNIVEN) and Lepelle Northern Water signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) at a formal ceremony held at the University's Faculty of Health Sciences building boardroom. The agreement began a strategic partnership to drive skills development, capacity building, and collaborative research in water and wastewater treatment. The MoU represents a significant step in empowering UNIVEN students through hands-on training and practical exposure to critical industry processes while enhancing the University's curriculum.

In her welcome remarks, Deputy-Vice Chancellor: Teaching and Learning, Prof Eucebious Lekalakala-Mokgele, emphasised the University's commitment towards collaborative engagement, commended the signing of this MoU. She highlighted the contributions of the Centre for Teaching and Learning, research efforts, and social responsibility, reflecting the institution's alignment with the scientific community. Prof Lekalakala-Mokgele also commended the Executive Dean of the Faculty of Science, Engineering, and Agriculture, Prof Natasha Potgieter, and staff members in this faculty for their instrumental role in fostering collaboration and addressing diverse areas such as water and microbiology.

In his address, the Vice-Chancellor and Principal of the University of Venda, Prof Bernard Nthambeleni, highlighted the signing of this MoU as significant between UNIVEN and the Lepelle

Northern Water (LNW), reflecting the University's commitment to addressing community challenges, particularly in water research. He traced the origins of the partnership to strategic networking. He emphasised UNIVEN's focus on impactful initiatives, such as establishing a Research Chair on the Water Environment, supported by national and international collaborators. including Chinese institutions. The Vice-Chancellor outlined the University's strategic pillars, emphasising student-centered education, entrepreneurial growth, strong governance, and robust partnerships. "Plans for growth, including satellite campuses and smart city collaborations, aim to alleviate capacity constraints and align with local economic development," said Prof Nthambeleni. As he concluded, the Vice-Chancellor underscored UNIVEN's sound financial management, ensuring resources are effectively utilised for bursaries, research, and other core activities, establishing the institution as a trusted and dynamic player in higher education.

Chairperson of Lepelle Northern Water Board, Dr. Nndweleni Mphephu, expressed optimism about the partnership, stating that he is excited to be signing an MoU of this caliber. He commended Lepelle Northern Water, which is comprised of a team of young, dedicated minds who work tirelessly to make a difference in people's lives. Dr. Mphephu highlighted that there is severe water scarcity in South Africa, but we must begin solving this challenge at home before we can even go outside this province. "We need these students to help us produce first-class quality water. Our water treatment plant systems are not running efficiently, and we now need students to conduct research that will help

solve these challenges. The security of the Water supply is critical. For us to come here is because we want to solve this water challenge in our province and country," he said.

Wrapping Up the 16-Day Activism Against Gender-Based Violence in Mauluma with the Traditional Council of Mauluma

On 8 December 2024, the Department of Youth in Development visited Mauluma Village under the leadership of Chief Ravele, to engage the community in a discussion about the significance of the 16-Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence (CBV).

With the support of the Executive Dean, Prof. Runhare, the department launched this workshop to address the ongoing issue of violence against women, which is primarily perpetrated by men against their spouses.

The discussion was initiated by doctoral candidate Ms Tshilidzi Mulaudzi, who highlighted the debilitating psycho-social effects of gender-based violence on its victims. Prof Daniel Thobejane emphasised that the 16-Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence should be viewed not as a limited campaign, but as an ongoing effort to eradicate this scourge. He also detailed the Gender-Based Violence Act of 1998 to the community members. Dr Harry Mukwevho further addressed the economic factors that often enable gender-based violence, stressing their importance in the broader context of this issue.

Chief Ravele concluded the event by expressing his gratitude to the University of Venda delegation (which included Mr Akani Baloyi, Dr Mukwevho, Ms Mulaudzi, and Prof Thobejane). He also highlighted the various community programmes aimed at improving the livelihoods of the people of Mauluma.

The EVB is designed to empower entrepreneurs from Universities of Technology, Historically Disadvantaged Universities (HDUs), and marginalised communities. The programme aims to provide a robust support system, equipping participants with the resources and expertise needed to turn innovative business ideas into sustainable, successful ventures.

At the recent launch event, Prof Michael Twum-Darko, the EVB Manager, highlighted the programme's commitment to fostering innovation and overcoming barriers to entrepreneurship. "We are dedicated to breaking down obstacles and creating pathways for entrepreneurs to flourish in the African market," he stated.

The EVB offers a comprehensive suite of services

to support budding entrepreneurs, including:

- **Mentor-in-Residence Programme:** Access to expert mentorship from university faculty specialising in technology transfer, innovation, and entrepreneurship.
- **Incubation and Acceleration**: Tailored guidance to help entrepreneurs progress from developing a Minimum Viable Product (MVP) to scaling their ventures for commercialisation.
- Focus on Inclusion: A strong emphasis on empowering student entrepreneurs and individuals from historically marginalised communities, ensuring equitable access to resources and opportunities.
- **Regional Impact:** Initially based at the Cape Peninsula University of Technology's Business Innovation and Incubation Centre (CPUT), the EVB will evolve into a decentralised model, expanding across multiple universities to reach a broader range of participants.

The EVB is the result of a powerful partnership between leading institutions in the region. In addition to the University of Venda, the other founding members include the Cape Peninsula University of Technology (CPUT), Durban University of Technology (DUT), Tshwane University of Technology (TUT), Namibia University of Science and Technology (NUST), Central University of Technology (CUT), and Walter Sisulu University (WSLI)

The initiative is generously funded by the Research and Innovation Systems for Africa (RISA) fund, a UK International Development initiative. This partnership marks a significant step forward in strengthening innovation ecosystems within South African campuses and surrounding communities, supporting the transformation of research into commercial success.

The EVB represents a forward-thinking approach to addressing Africa's entrepreneurial challenges. By supporting young entrepreneurs, especially those from underserved communities, this initiative has the potential to drive economic growth and contribute to the long-term development of Southern Africa.
